

With nearly 500 runs in a packed program, Reining Australia welcomed a record number of horses and riders to our 2016 Gold Buckle Futurity and National Championships held at AELEC in Tamworth from the 20th to the 24th of September.

The competition started on Monday afternoon with judging of the Great Reiner Cook Off. First place and the champion's trophy went to Grace Christoffel with a fine plate of pastries. Ed Smith and his fruitcake filled the reserve position. The award for the most creative baked goods went to Tracy Ralph's beautiful buckskin entry.

With five days of showing due to start on Tuesday, inductions to the Hall of Fame and the fundraising auction were scheduled for Monday evening. Thank you to those who donated some great items to the auction, and thank you also to the bidders.

At the same time, the annual Nationals get-together livened up any serious stuff and added to the reckless nature of the bidding. This year, the theme of the Calliope Sliders party was Pirates, and a host of Jack Sparrows and buxom wenches joined less decorative and more scurvy competitors in the fun.

More than 60 entrants signed up for the Green Rider classes on Day 1 and faced judge Ann Salmon Anderman from the USA. Congratulations to Mackinley Glover riding Leos Little Beaver, winner of the Green Rider Level 1, who produced some magnificent stops and strong all-round elements to earn a 70½ score. Leos Little Beaver was just a ½ point ahead of Alice Baker and Onya Amberlin with Ben Ditzel and Onya Wotshername securing third spot with a 68½ showing.

The Green Rider Level 2 was just as competitive as Level 1 with some outstanding performances. Congratulations to Lillian Johnson on Oaks Colonel Hollywood, winner of the Green Rider Level 2 on a score of 69½. These two have got quite the combination happening and will be strong contenders as they move through the levels in the years ahead. They were a point ahead of Graeme Bell and Down N Boogie (68½), just holding out Jessica Miller and Little Roan Oak (68) for third place. What a great comp, congratulations to all in a very strong field.

Reining Australia acknowledges Errol and Gita Thomas from Thomas Arena Products for their generosity and dedication to the grass roots of reining, and the support they give to the Green Rider program.

It was raining outside on this Tamworth Wednesday, but the reining inside kept us warm. Judge Filippo Masi (Italy) took the chair to decide the winners of the opening class on a very big second day. The Marsh Carney Saddlery Novice Horse competition covered four categories: Novice Horse Open Level 1 and Level 2, and Novice Horse Non Pro Level 1 and Level 2. More than 70 horse and rider combinations lined up across these classes. Yves Cousinard and the great mare Spicy Little Step won the Novice Horse Open Level 2 with their score of $70^{1/2}$.

Oliver Reinhardt filled second place on Miss Acres Olena with 69½, then five combinations tied for third on 69: Brooke Sestero and Jessies Dreamchaser, Tania Powell and Onya Amberlin, Mackenzie Bascombe and Lethally Cowsmart, Stephan Elenius and Jewel Park Bewhizzed and Noel Watson with Lil Shot.

The Marsh Carney Saddlery Novice Horse competition produced a special result for one competitor. Oliver Reinhardt has never won a "big event"; lower level places but never "the one". Today, in front of a very enthusiastic crowd, Oliver Reinhardt aboard Miss Acres Olena (69½) secured the champion's buckle and all the goodies in the Novice Horse Open Level 1 with his run.

Hannah Lloyd and Whizzel Me Lucky continue to grow together as a combination. Today they were the deserving winners of the Novice Horse Non Pro Level 2 class with a score of 69½. In an overall class of 70+ combinations, we had a three-way run-off for the Novice Horse Non Pro Level 1 title.

So, with lots of (no doubt) anxious nerves, our three combatants went into friendly battle to decide the winner. Gita Thomas and Nu Lil Spark, Greg Smith and Whiz Charm and Pam Spokes aboard Mustang Lil, all on 68½, went head-to-head for the champion's buckle in the Novice Horse Non Pro Level 1.

All three combinations again completed Pattern 6 to the best of their ability, and the crowd was LOUD! Gotta love a reining crowd! Run-off scores are not announced at the completion of the runs, so the competitors and the crowd had no idea who would be the victor. In the end, there was just ½ a point in it. Greg Smith was the winner with Pam Spokes and Gita Thomas tied for reserve.

We would like to extend a very big thank you to Novice Horse Non Pro buckle sponsor Jolene King for presenting the prizes in these two classes and for providing lots of amazing products from the Hold Your Horses Promotional Embroidery range for our winners and place-getters.

The Humpty Dumpty Open/Non Pro Ladies' Event on Wednesday afternoon was organised by the Peters Family as a fundraiser for the Humpty Dumpty Foundation. The Foundation raises money to buy life-saving medical equipment in over 250 hospitals Australia-wide for paediatric wards, neonatal units, and maternity and emergency departments. A handicap system made the competition even for all entrants. The winner was Stephanie Cooper riding her stallion "Sam" (aka Cromed By Custom). 



Both judges settled in to their chairs for the duration and more than 40 riders set out to win buckles in the Xtreme Genes Intermediate Non Pro and Intermediate Open classes and the Rick Meredith Rookie Professional class.

Another run-off with two riders on 137½ decided the Intermediate Open. Shelley Peters and Tell Me A Story emerged as the winning combination with Lana Kelderman on OP Im A Smokey Whizz in second place. Ed Laxton on Bigriverspanner in the works and Helen Balu riding Whizkey On The Rocks, both on 137, tied for third place.





After a quick break, spectators made themselves comfortable in the stands with high expectations for the 2016 Gold Buckle Futurity. Congratulations to all the connections for presenting such beautiful horses and for educating, guiding and working them over so many hours to get to the very high standard that we saw.

John Wicks and Onya Ima Cool Step won the 2016 Reining Australia Gold Buckle Futurity with a fabulous 142 run. They took the title by the narrowest of margins ahead of Noel Watson and Colonel Einstein with 141½.







The Back On Track Limited Open and WA Reining Limited Non Pro opened the competition on Saturday. A personal best of 142 on Whizzel With Me was more than enough for Mel Sporry to pick up the champion's buckle in both classes.

Mel's score just held off Brooke Sestero on Jessies Dreamchaser (141) who took home the reserve champions' prizes in both classes. Mel came to Tamworth for this one event, to do "the best she could". You can't do more than win!

In the Limited Non Pro, Hannah Lloyd and Whizzel Me Lucky placed third with 138½. Carolyn Peters with the evergreen Chics Navajo and Alexandra Leach aboard Mizz Whiz, both on 138, shared fourth place. In the Limited Open class, Josephine Hale on Whiz Fizz (138) tied with Carolyn and Chics Navajo for third place.

The Reining Trainers Australia Non Pro Futurity offered an action-packed afternoon on the fifth day of competition. From the first competitor that went through the gate, a group of up-and-coming horses performed to the best of their ability making the event one to remember. This was the largest number of entries to date in the Non Pro Futurity and the event is gradually expanding its footprint at the National show.

The winning combination was Mick Taylor and Lil Gold Digger on 138. Mick took home a reining saddle from Southern Cross (their third sponsored saddle for the show) as well as the buckle and trophy.

Michelle Moore on Mooredun Smart Lil Chic (135) came in second behind Mick, and ahead of Leonie Kingdon and My Chics No Wimp (134), in the Open division of the Non Pro Futurity and this ride took her into the winning position in the Intermediate and Limited divisions of the event.

The AQHA incentive awards for the 2016 Non Pro Futurity went to Leonie Kingdon and My Chics No Wimp. Leonie on 134½ was runner-up to Michelle Moore in the Intermediate and Limited divisions. Tony Bryers and Nu Shiney Oak (134) followed Leonie into the minor places of fourth and third in all divisions.

The 2016 Reining Australia National Championships wrapped up on Saturday night when the big girls and boys took the stage again. The National Derby competition returned to the Nationals after a long absence with the running of the Ariat Reining Australia Non Pro Derby and the Turnabout Farm Reining Australia Open Derby.

The 2016 Non Pro Derby champion combination, Cameron Halliwell and Gottagetagunner (139½), scored just half a point more than Errol Thomas and Shiney Nu Addition in the reserve position on 139. There was tie for third place between Erin Neylon riding Lil Miss Genius and Stephanie Cooper on Cromed By Custom.

Erin and Steph were both entered in the Intermediate and Limited divisions of the Non Pro Derby and their score of 138 put them in first place in those classes. The crowd was treated to a tense and exciting run-off for the two buckles with Steph and Cromed By Custom emerging as the winners after the duo improved on their original score.

The Open Derby was a hotly contested class. Cameron Halliwell on Gottagetagunner came in fifth with his score of 139½. He was just one point behind Noel Watson and Einstein Flashy Jac in fourth place. Rob Lawson aboard Tony Mitchell's imported mare Revolution Reddy took third place with their score of 142½. Shaun Saunders put down a terrific run for the reserve position on Darren Mullan's QXH Docs Stylish Oak (143½).

The man they couldn't catch wore a green shirt. Warren Backhouse had opened his 2016 championship account on Thursday night with a 145½ run on Checkout Hollywood in the Thomas Arena Products Open. Congratulations to Warren, "Cody" and all the connections; it was a wonderful way to finish the day, the event, and the show.

Cameron Halliwell's score of 139½ on Gottagetagunner won him the Intermediate division of the Open Derby and Erin Neylon and Lil Miss Genius were consoled for their defeat in the run-off by taking home the buckle for the Limited division of the Open Derby.






